

# MITCHELL NAMED NEW RMS PRINCIPAL, WILLIAMS RHS GIRLS BASKETBALL COACH

Roseville Community Schools is proud to announce Michael Mitchell, Ed.D., as the new principal of Roseville Middle School beginning this fall. In addition, Aja Williams has been named head coach of the Roseville High School Girls Basketball Program, moving up from junior varsity.

Mitchell began his teaching career in 1998. He spent the next ten years teaching science and social studies at several schools, including St. Juliana, Regina High School, and Lake Orion Community Schools' Learning Options High School. In 2005, he joined Arts Academy in the Woods, where he taught a variety of science and social studies courses. For the past twelve years, he has served as the Academy's principal/

lead administrator, overseeing all academic, operational, fiscal functions. Mitchell holds an associate degree from Macomb Community College, as well as a bachelor's degree in biological sciences and a master's degree in secondary science education, both from Wayne State University. In 2014, Mitchell received his Doctor of Education degree in Educational

Leadership and Administration from Walden University.

Mitchell said he is excited to be an active part of a team that puts students first. "I have been consistently impressed with Roseville Community Schools' supportive staff and programs that help students achieve their full potential academically and socially. I bring an experienced, consistent, and caring presence for our students, staff, and community members. I look forward to meeting everyone and hearing how I can help Roseville Community Schools empower students for a lifetime of success."

"What stands out most about Dr. Mitchell is his passion for all kids," said Superintendent Mark Blaszkowski. "His experience overseeing students from middle school to high school as a principal brings a perspective that will help our students prepare for the next level."

Mitchell takes over for Chris LaFeve, who is leaving Roseville for a position closer to his home. "We appreciate all the hard work Mr. LaFeve did for our district over the years. We wish him the best of luck in his hometown and hope he enjoys spending more time with his young family."

Aja Williams, a 2013 Roseville High School graduate, returns to the court where she excelled as a player. During her RHS career, she was a four-year varsity player and twoyear captain. After battling back from injuries, she played two years at St. Clair County Community College, helping the team make a Final Four national championship run during the 2013-2014 season. The following year, she served as team captain and earned the team's Leadership Achievement Award.

In the ten years since college, Williams has coached

a variety of teams. She has coached

the AAU Midwest Athletic Basketball team, served as assistant coach/statistician for the Madison High School boys varsity basketball team, and last season returned to Roseville as the JV girls basketball coach, leading the team to a 13-3 record. Williams said she wants Roseville High School

to be a place where young girls dream of playing. "I plan on instilling a will to win, building a sense of family, and teaching the girls to put their best foot forward no matter the situation."

Roseville High School Athletic Director Keith Marzec said he is excited to see where Williams can take the program. "She did a great job as JV coach last year, building strong relationships and developing the skills needed to be successful. She has a lot of coaching experience, and as an alum, I believe she will continue to grow the success of the program."

# MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT



After a year of conducting facility assessments and community engagement, we are planning to propose some important updates to our school district. An independent facilities study confirms that they are necessary. In addition, a community survey and a series of focus panels show that there is community support for the changes, although many

community members have questions.

Over the next few months, I will be making community presentations and providing more detailed information about what is being proposed. In the meantime, I wanted to provide a quick overview and personally invite you to reach out to me if you'd like more information or have questions. Right now, we have more schools than we need. For schools to operate efficiently and offer the best experience for students, they should be filled to about 85% capacity. Currently, our elementary schools average about 49%, and our middle schools are around 41%.

### HERE'S WHAT WE'RE PROPOSING:

Middle School: Close Eastland Middle School and build a brand-new elementary school on that site to serve students from Martin Rd. to 14 Mile Rd. between Gratiot and Groesbeck. All middle school students would then attend a newly updated and rebranded middle school.

**Elementary Schools:** Close Kaiser, Dort, and Patton Elementary Schools. Those buildings would either be converted into

green spaces or used for our Building Trades program. Fountain Elementary would be converted into an early childhood center to support our fast-growing early childhood education program.

### THERE ARE THREE MAIN GOALS BEHIND THIS PROPOSAL:

- 1. To significantly reduce operating costs.

# **ROSEVILLE COMMUNITY SCHOOLS REVIEWS BOND PROJECT SURVEY RESULTS**

Roseville Community Schools is reviewing feedback from parents, staff, students, and community members who shared their time and input during a recent community outreach initiative. The feedback gathered between September 8 and 18 will help guide the school district as it continues planning for a potential May 2026 zero-tax-rate-increase bond proposal.

Superintendent Mark Blaszkowski said the school district greatly appreciates the honest conversations and thoughtful questions that emerged during the outreach process. "These conversations are just the beginning," Blaszkowski said. "We'll continue to listen, answer questions, and make sure our community has the information it needs as we shape the next steps together."

Participants expressed strong support for prioritizing the basics, including facility infrastructure, safety and security, updating learning environments, and improvements to playgrounds, arts, and athletic facilities. Most of the discussion focused on the school district's long-term facility plan, including school consolidation, construction of a new elementary, and the creation of an Early Childhood Center. Some participants supported consolidating facilities to reduce

costs and address declining enrollment, while others raised questions about busing, the loss of neighborhood schools, and potential impacts on class sizes and staffing.

The proposal to build a new elementary school on the Eastland Middle School site drew both excitement and questions. Many participants saw it as a chance to create a modern, student-centered space, while others wanted more details about traffic, boundaries, and the reasons for not considering renovation. There was strong support for converting Fountain Elementary into an Early Childhood Center to expand preschool opportunities, though participants asked for clarification about staffing, transportation, and program logistics. "We're hearing both excitement and questions from the community, and that helps us build a balanced, thoughtful plan for the future," Blaszkowski said.

School district leaders will continue to review all feedback and develop materials to answer the most frequently asked questions. In the coming months, Roseville Community Schools will host public informational sessions to share updated project details, cost information, and the reasoning behind proposed plans.

# VIOLET KRUPP - KMENT ELEMENTARY

Violet Krupp is beginning her eighth year as a classroom teacher. She started her career in education as a substitute teacher and as an Indian Education Specialist with Chippewa Valley Schools. Krupp began her full-time teaching career at Academy of Warren before moving to Roseville, where she has spent the past five years. She taught at Patton Elementary for three years before settling in at Kment Elementary. "I am currently teaching second grade, but I have taught everything from K-6 and tutored K-8 through the Indian Education Consortium," she said. She also taught sixth grade during this summer's Extended Learning Program. Like her students, Krupp enjoys learning. "I love that I'm

always learning something new — new curriculum, new personalities, new TikTok trends — and the list goes on." She added that she loves the March is Reading Month festivities each year, as well as preparing for major holidays with her students. "Making Christmas gifts that they can give to someone special and having a Thanksgiving feast Snoopy would be proud of while watching a true classic." ### **REBA STANLEY - ROSEVILLE HIGH SCHOOL**

Reba Stanley is now in her eighth year at Roseville High School. She spent her first three years as a special education aide and is now beginning her fifth year as a teacher, running the 9–12 Mild Cognitively Impaired Program. Stanley said she loves building relationships with her students. "The culture at RHS is amazing, and I love being there for all students." She added that she enjoys teaching her students life skills for post-graduation. "Twice a month we go grocery shopping, making lists based on recipes we choose as a class. Then, each Thursday, we cook for our class to learn that life skill." Stanley is involved at RHS outside of teaching as well, including helping to coach the Unified Soccer and Basketball Teams — the latter of which won the State Championship last year. She also runs the

school's Green Team. "We have earned Evergreen Status, which is the highest award you can receive from the MISD for being a green school." Additionally, she helps teach Sound Mind, Sound Body with Coach Vernard Snowden to the school's football team, cheerleaders, and girls' track team. "This program encourages athletes to be well-rounded and promotes self-confidence and healthy lifestyle choices." Stanley attended Macomb Community College for her associate degree, Wayne State University, and then Western Governors University for her teaching degree. She has seven siblings who, like her, all attended Roseville Community Schools. She enjoys trying new restaurants with friends, spending time with her three sisters, and having "Auntie Reba" sleepovers with her eight nieces and nephews. She also enjoys watching football. "My favorite teams are Roseville High School, the Eagles, and of course, the Detroit Lions!!"

This summer, more than 500 students participated in five extra weeks of exciting learning through the RCS Extended Learning Summer Program! RCS also hosted the annual Girls' STEM Camp during the last two weeks of June, where participants explored hands-on projects such as circuit building and soldering, designing assistive technology devices, making toys accessible for children with disabilities, programming robots, using power tools, and learning the basics of 3D printing. They even enjoyed a Q&A session with former Roseville students - now female STEM professionals - who shared their expertise and inspiration. 
