



## ROSEVILLE SCHOOLS PREPARES 100-YEAR ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS

Roseville Community Schools will spend the 2024-2025 school year celebrating a century of successful alumni, educational excellence, and community spirit. The district will celebrate its 100th anniversary with a series of events and activities to honor the momentous occasion. "Our district has so much to celebrate," said Superintendent Mark Blaszkowski. "100 years of existence is a sign of pride, resilience, and strength, leaving a legacy in which our students, retired and current staff members, and alumni can be proud. Schools will be doing activities throughout the years honoring our hundred years. It is going to be an exciting time for our entire school community."

The year-long celebration kicks off with the fourth annual Panther Day, being held at Roseville High School on Saturday, August 17 from 4:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. The fun, family event will feature food trucks, performances by the RHS marching band and cheer teams, the annual Red vs. Black football game, and bounce houses and games for the kids, including a punt, pass, kick competition. Roseville High School Principal Jason

Bettin said that Panther Day is a great way to kick off the new school year and the 100th year of serving the community. "Our goal is that all students in Roseville eventually become Panthers. We are excited to have an expanded event that is a fun, family-oriented way to connect with our schools and staff and see all the RCS has to offer the community."

Roseville High School's 2024 Homecoming festivities will be held on Friday, October 11. The parade starts at 5:00 p.m. followed by the homecoming game vs. L'anse Creuse at 7:00 p.m. "Homecoming is always the event where we welcome back our alumni, and we would like to see more community members than ever help us celebrate 100 years," said Bettin. He added that RHS is planning how to incorporate the 100-year anniversary into themes for prom and graduation as well, celebrating the hundredth class to graduate from RCS. "It is important to understand, remember, and honor the past. This school year provides an excellent opportunity for us to do

that as a community by celebrating all the accomplishments and alumni of RCS." Other opportunities for the community, alumni, and former staff members to join in the celebration will be announced at a later date. "At all our events throughout the entire year, alumni will have the ability to join our "R Club", which is the club for Roseville Alumni Varsity Letterwinners to continue to be part of Roseville athletics as we grow and celebrate future successes," added Bettin.

Board of Education President Theresa Genest said the district could not have made it this far without the support of the community. "The successful bonds and millages our community has passed have helped us create great programs and opportunities for our students. On behalf of myself and the other board of education members, I would like to say how excited we all are to be celebrating our 100th anniversary." Roseville's first graduating class in 1925 consisted of nine students. Throughout the years, as the community has evolved, so has the district. We currently service close to

4500 students throughout our seven elementary schools, two middle schools, and high school. Blaszkowski said that the fact that the Roseville Community Schools has been around for 100 years shows the deep commitment to the education of this community. "RCS has a long, rich history of commitment to educating students in this community and 100 years is evidence of a dedicated commitment to this community. We look forward to continuing that commitment for the next hundred years."

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## MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT



Summer is always a great time to enjoy the warm weather, have fun with friends and family, and to recharge our batteries. But the summer months are also busy as we get ready for the upcoming school year.

As we begin the next school year, we will be working hard to improve attendance. Chronic absenteeism numbers have been high across the country since the pandemic.

The most recent state data shows we have reduced chronic absenteeism by 11.5%, and while this data is promising, we still have much more work to do. The district has a committee working on initiatives to reduce the number of students who are chronically absent. This fall, we will be beginning an incentive program for students, recognizing and rewarding them for attending school regularly.

We will also be introducing a "Safe Walk to School" campaign beginning this school year. The campaign will ask community members to commit to watching the neighborhood

when kids are travelling to and from school and report any suspicious behaviors. To show the community we are watching, we have created yard signs for those willing to commit to this promise. We ask every one of you to at least commit to helping provide a safe walk to school for our students.

As you may have seen, we are celebrating our 100th graduating class this year. It is the "community" in Roseville Community Schools that allows the district to continue to provide excellent educational opportunities for our students. On behalf of the district, I would like to thank each of you and invite you to share in Panther Day, Homecoming, or any of the other festivities being held this year in celebration of the centennial year for the Roseville Community Schools. 100 years shows our longevity and commitment to the community of Roseville, and we have so much to celebrate!

## ALUMNI CORNER

While at RHS, she was very active, playing softball, participating in the marching band, and serving as a member of many clubs, including the National Honor Society, News and Broadcasting, Newspaper, and Envirothon. She also credits some of her favorite teachers for many important life lessons. "Mr. Blackmer helped me make smart decisions and strive to reach my full potential and Mrs. Jordan always challenged me to think about the world in new ways, setting an example for what it means to be of service to her community and the world." After high school, Morgan attended Central Michigan University where she earned a Bachelors in Global Studies. She then continued her education, becoming certified and accredited as a life coach with the International Coaching Federation. She now works as a certified life coach, working one-on-one with clients to help them improve their quality of life. In her spare time, she enjoys coaching Roseville High School's color guard, gardening, weightlifting, networking, and collecting and playing modern board games. ## ROSEVILLE INDUCTS FIVE NEW MEMBERS INTO ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

Roseville High School inducted five new members into their Athletic Hall of Fame at a ceremony on May 30, 2024. This year's inductees were Ed Mizinski, Bob Wilson, Doug Dawson, Erica Martin, and Angela Martin.

The induction ceremony took place in the RHS auditorium with a reception for the inductees held in the culinary arts wing prior to the induction ceremony. It was the fourth class of inductees and the first since 2020. "We are excited to have the event return and be able to celebrate such a great class of athletes," said Roseville High School Athletic Director Keith Marzec. "Tonight is not just about highlighting former athletes, but it's also a way to bring together alumni, old friends, and the whole Roseville community." Marzec added that one of the goals of the athletic department is to continue to develop established relationships with all those who have represented and built Roseville Community Schools. "Tonight, we champion as one, honor our past, and build our future."

The inaugural RHS Hall of Fame class featured Ernie Whitt, Brian Sikorski, Davon Gray, Joe Pantaleo, Vanessa Blair, Rich Maloney, Harry Sullins, and Stan Mizinski. The following years saw standout athletes Cliff Howe, Anthony Stadwick, Marie Palinkas, Robert Zimmerman, Micaela Mayer, and Ken Fiott added to the list. Also included in the initial three classes were coaches Maxwell Berry and Bob DeStefano and two teams: The 1997 RHS wrestling team and the 1949 Eastland High School basketball team. A selection committee consisting of former Roseville Athletic Directors from the current Roseville High School, Brablec High School, and the original RHS, vote each year for the class of honorees. To be inducted, former athletes must have graduated from Roseville Community Schools, been out of school for ten years, have played collegiate sports and/or earned honors at the league or state level.

**Ed Mizinski** - Mizinski graduated from the original Roseville High School in 1971 where he was a standout athlete in multiple sports. He starred on the football field, earning All-Eastern Michigan League, All-Macomb County, Detroit Free Press All-Suburban, and All-State Honorable Mention honors. As a member of the track team, he was a state finalist in the 440-yard dash. Mizinski earned a scholarship to Eastern Michigan University where he would continue his football career.

**Bob Wilson** - Wilson is a 1995 graduate who excelled in several sports at Roseville High School. On the wrestling mat, he was a two-time state champion in the 140/151lb weight classes. He was a four-time state qualifier, compiling a 163-28-1 record, and was named to the All-State team three times. He played three years of varsity baseball, as well as two years of varsity football, earning offensive MVP during his senior season. He has also spent several years coaching for RHS.

**Doug Dawson** - Dawson graduated from Roseville High School in 2007. While at RHS, he excelled in soccer and track. In soccer, he was named first-team All-Conference his junior and senior years. On the track, he holds the school record in the 400m and 1600m relay and was named to the All-State team in the 400m his senior year. He continued his soccer and track careers at Sienna Heights after high school where he was a NAIA National Champion in the 400m.

**Erica Martin** - Martin is a 2010 Roseville High School graduate. She was a three-sport star, lettering in basketball, volleyball, and softball. During her career, she earned twelve varsity letters and an all-academic letter. She was named Roseville High School's 2010 Girls' Basketball MVP and the 2010 RHS Outstanding Female Athlete. She won a MAC league championship in all three sports.

**Angela Martin** - Martin graduated from RHS in 2011 and was also a three-sport star who lettered in basketball, volleyball, and softball. She earned All-Conference honors in all three sports, as well as All-Conference defensive honors in 2008. She was a four-time MVP in softball, earning a scholarship to play at Concordia.

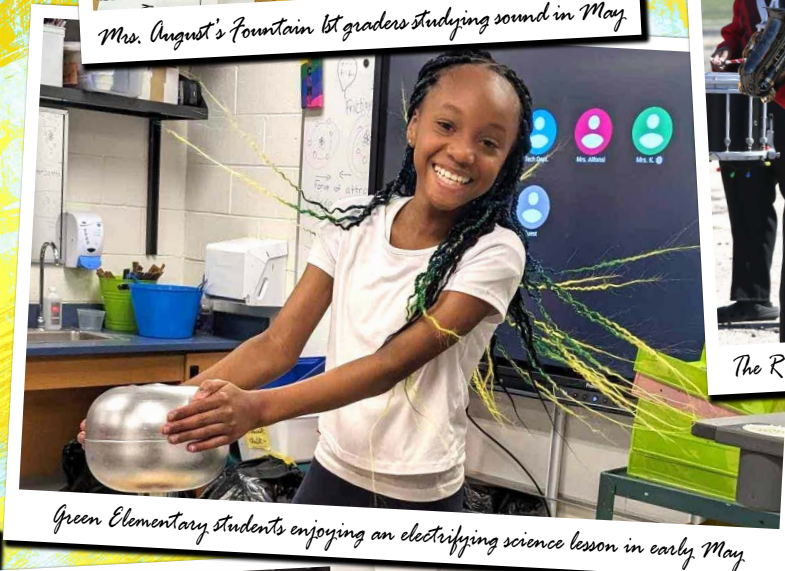

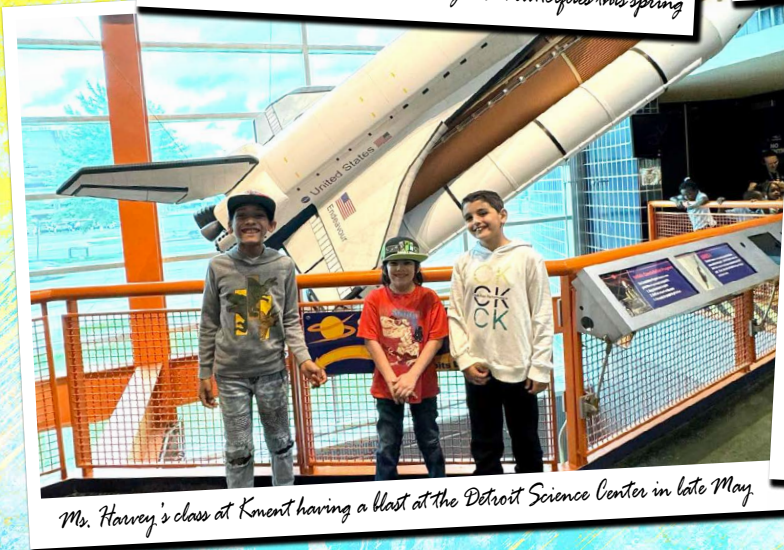

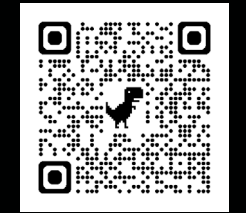

## Statement of Assurance of Compliance with Federal Law

It is the policy of the Roseville Community Schools District that no discriminatory practices based on gender/sex, race, religion, color, age, national origin, disability, height, weight, or any other status covered by federal, state or local law be allowed in providing instructional opportunities, programs, services, job placement assistance, employment or in policies governing student conduct and attendance.

Grievance Procedure :

Section 1: Any person believing that the Roseville Community School District, or any part of the school organization, has discriminated on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender/sex, age, disability, height, weight or marital status, may file a grievance with:

Grievance forms are available from any building principal or from the Administration Building.

Section 2: All grievances will be processed through the following steps:

A. A written statement of the grievance, using the district's grievance form, shall be submitted to the Civil Rights Coordinator.

B. Upon receipt of the completed grievance form, the Coordinator will conduct an investigation and notify grievant of the results, including any remedial measures. Normally, the investigation will be concluded within (30) thirty school days.

C. Within (10) ten school days, the grievant may appeal, in writing, to the Superintendent of Schools, who will make a written decision, normally within thirty (30) school days.

The complete grievance procedure is found in Roseville Community School Board Policy GAAD, which can be obtained from the Coordinator

## Video Surveillance

Roseville Schools periodically monitors school property, grounds, buses and buildings using video cameras to ensure the security of students, staff, and property.

## Roseville Protects Privacy Rights

The Roseville Community Schools will not release personal student records such as grades, attendance or test results without the signature of the parent or the student (if over 18 years of age).

However, under the Family Education Rights & Privacy Act, (FERPA), the district is permitted to release information which would normally be found in school yearbooks, catalogs or student directories. This could include name, address, phone number, birth date, field of study, honors, awards and general photographs.

If parents object to the release of such information, they must state their objection to the building principal in writing.

## Visitors

All visitors are asked to report to the school office when visiting a building.

## No Smoking Policy

A state law prohibits smoking in or on school property. This includes district owned buildings or vehicles and property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the school district. The law and Roseville board policy seek to model behavior that supports district curriculum regarding health and safety. Thank you for your cooperation in promoting a healthy environment for students and employees.

## Roseville Public Schools Pesticide Program Public Notice

In accordance with Public Act 131, school administrators must advise parents or guardians of their right to be notified prior to the application of pesticide at their child's school.

As a result of this regulation, you are being advised that a routine application of pesticide will take place the first week of each month in each school. These applications will take place after school hours in non-student areas, e.g., boiler rooms, custodial closets, etc. The product used will be a water based formulation, odorless and of low toxicity. In certain emergencies, pesticides may be applied prior to notification. If more specific information is needed, please complete and return the form below.

## Asbestos Update

The Roseville Community Schools recently completed their six month Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) surveillance reports and will soon be conducting their three year re-inspection for all remaining asbestos-containing building materials. These reports are required by the Environmental Protection Agency. Copies are maintained in the offices of building administrators and are available for public review.

This notification is required annually in accordance with the Federal Register 40 CFR Part 763.

Register at your neighborhood school. Kindergarten students must be five-years-old on or before September 1, 2024

Required for registration:

- Certified copy of birth certificate
- Three proofs of residency
- Immunization records
- Vision & hearing test for kindergarten students only
- Last report card for older student (if available)

## Immunization Required

New legislation requires Hepatitis B immunizations for all children in day care and for all children entering school for the first time.

The series of 3 injections is available at the Health Department free of charge to youngsters from age four until their 19<sup>th</sup> birthday. For more information, call the Macomb County Health Department in St. Clair Shores.
