

MIGLIO NAMED NEW PRINCIPAL AT GREEN, PAUL EMS DEAN OF STUDENTS

Roseville Community Schools is proud to announce two administrators for the 2025-2026 school year. Rebecca Miglio will be the new principal of Green Elementary, Ann Paul will be the new Dean of Students at Eastland Middle School.

Miglio takes over as principal at Green Elementary after more than thirty years teaching elementary in the district, most recently at Green. In addition to her years as a classroom teacher, she has spent the past six years as one of the district's instructional coaches, helping colleagues integrate classroom technology into their curriculum. She has served in a variety of other capacities during her career, including as a member

of school PBIS committees, district leadership committees, professional development committees, well as co-chair for the district's math school improvement plan committee. Miglio holds a Bachelor of Science in Education from Wayne State University and a master's in administration from Saginaw Valley University with an elementary and secondary administrator certificate.

Miglio said that she looks forward to continuing her career as part of the Green community. "I already have a fantastic team to work with and an exceptional group of students and their families to support." Superintendent Mark Blaszkowski said that Miglio has a long track record of elementary experience. "She has been a teacher, an instructional coach, and a pioneer of technology in the classroom. She is a hardworking individual that is innovative and supportive to staff and students alike. Her experience will be a great asset as we transition from Donna Ambrose."

Miglio takes over for Ambrose, who retires from Roseville Community Schools after more than thirty years in education. She said that she feels completely blessed and honored to have worked in Roseville. "I have fond memories of all the students I have had the privilege of working with and will never forget them. I also have made lifelong friends. Roseville is truly a family." Blaszkowski said that Ambrose has been an extremely effective principal at Green Elementary. "She has always cared for her students and families by listening to their needs and doing the best she could to help them. She built a culture of teamwork, which has paid dividends to our students. We wish her the best in her retirement."

Ann Paul has been in Roseville for six years, teaching English Language Arts at Roseville Middle School. In addition to her time in the classroom, she has served as a member of the school improvement, leadership, and curriculum teams, all aimed at enhancing the district's educational quality. She has also spent time as Roseville Middle School's Teacher in Charge, as well as the lead for the New Teacher Induction Program. Paul received a bachelor's degree in English education from

Ferris State and a master's degree

in K-12 administration from Eastern Michigan. She said that she is excited about the new position. "I look forward to supporting the behavioral and academic growth of all students at EMS by partnering with staff and families to ensure every student is supported and successful."



Blaszkowski said that Paul will make a great addition to the Eastland Middle School staff. "She has completed her degree, served in leadership roles, and has great relationships with students, staff, and parents. We look forward to her contribution to the administrative team." Paul takes over for Alexandra Muhammad, who is moving out of the area. Blaszkowski thanked her for her years in Roseville. MESSAGE FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT



celebrating our 100th graduating class. It was filled with activities, recognition, and lots of memories. We were able to share all of those with the community, students, staff, and alumni alike. Like everything else, all good things must come to an end. Now we must look to the future of our schools and find ways to continue to

prepare for the future.

Roseville Community Schools is in the process of developing a no-tax-rate-increase bond proposal for the May 2026 ballot aimed at improving facilities, modernizing learning environments, and aligning school buildings with current and future student needs. School district leaders, alongside construction and architectural partners, have spent the past several months assessing facility conditions and exploring potential improvements.

As planning continues, a draft proposal is expected to be shared with the community in the next few months to gather input and feedback before finalizing the bond scope. A major focus of the bond proposal is reducing operational costs, which could be achieved by potentially consolidating schools. Other potential projects include creating an early childhood learning

This past year we had the pleasure of facility, upgrading outdated mechanical, electrical, paving, lighting, and building infrastructure, enhancing safety and security systems across district facilities, improving classroom technology and instructional equipment, and replacing aging school buses.

> Our goal is to create safer, more efficient, and updated spaces for our students and staff. We are working carefully to balance educational needs, facility conditions, and community priorities, and we look forward to hearing from residents as we shape this proposal together. We anticipate holding focus groups and launching a community survey in the upcoming months to gather feedback. Final bond plans will be shaped by community input and presented to the Board of Education later this year. More information will be shared with the community as the bond planning process continues. tree and is ready to take our program to the next level."



Statement of Assurance of Compliance with Federal Law

It is the policy of the Roseville Community Schools District that no discriminatory practices based on gender/sex, race, religion, color, age, national origin, disability, height, weight, or any other status covered by federal, state or local law be allowed in providing instructional opportunities, programs, services, job placement assistance, employment or in policies governing student conduct and attendance.

Grievance Procedure:

Section 1: Any person believing that the Roseville Community School District, or any part of the school organization, has discriminated on the basis of race, color, national origin, gender/sex, age, disability, height, weight or marital status, may file a arievance with:

Grievance forms are available from any building principal or from the Administration

Section 2: All grievances will be processed through the following steps:

A. A written statement of the grievance, using the district's grievance form, shall be submitted to the Civil Rights Coordinator.

B. Upon receipt of the completed grievance form, the Coordinator will conduct an investigation and notify grievant of the results, including any remedial measures. Normally, the investigation will be concluded within (30) thirty school days.

C. Within (10) ten school days, the grievant may appeal, in writing, to the Superintendent of Schools, who will make a written decision, normally within thirty (30) school days.

The complete grievance procedure is found in Roseville Community School Board Policy GAAD, which can be obtained from the Coordinator

Video Surveillance

Roseville Schools periodically monitors school property, grounds, buses and buildings using video cameras to ensure the security of students, staff, and property.

Roseville Protects Privacy Riahts

The Roseville Community Schools will not release personal student records such as arades, attendance or test results without the signature of the parent or the student (if over 18 years of age).

However, under the Family Education Rights & Privacy Act. (FERPA), the district is permitted to release information which would normally be found in school yearbooks, catalogs or student directories. This could include name, address, phone number, birth date, field of study, honors, awards and general photographs.

If parents object to the release of such information, they must state their objection to the building principal in writing.

Visitors

All visitors are asked to report to the school office when visiting a building.

No Smoking Policy

A state law prohibits smoking in or on school property. This includes district owned buildings or vehicles and property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the school district. The law and Roseville board policy seek to model behavior that supports district curriculum regarding health and safety. Thank you for your cooperation in promoting a healthy environment for students and employees.

Roseville Public Schools Pesticide **Program Public Notice**

In accordance with Public Act 131, school administrators must advise parents or guardians of their right to be notified prior to the application of pesticide at their child's

As a result of this regulation, you are being advised that a routine application of pesticide will take place the first week of each month in each school. These applications will take place after school hours in non-student areas, e.g., boiler rooms, custodial closets, etc. The product used will be a water based formulation, odorless and of low toxicity. In certain emergencies, pesticides may be applied prior to notification. If more specific information is needed, please complete and return the form below.

Asbestos Update

The Roseville Community Schools recently completed their six month Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA) surveillance reports and will soon be conducting their three year re-inspection for all remaining asbestoscontaining building materials. These reports are required by the Environmental Protection Agency. Copies are maintained in the offices of building administrators and are available for public review.

This notification is required annually in accordance with the Federal Register 40 CFR

New Kindergarten Students

Register at your neighborhood school. Kindergarten students must be five-years-old on or before September 1, 2025

Required for registration:

- -Certified copy of birth certificate
- -Three proofs of residency
- -Immunization records
- -Vision & hearing test for kindergarten students only
- -Last report card for older student (if available)

Immunization Required

New legislation requires Hepatitis B immunizations for all children in day care and for all children entering school for the first time.

The series of 3 injections is available at the Health Department free of charge to youngsters from age four until their 19th birthday. For more information, call the Macomb County Health Department in St. Clair Shores.


