Dear Students and Families,

As we step into the winter and second semester, it's a time for new beginnings—new schedules, new classes, new friends, and new challenges. It's hard to believe we're already halfway through the school year. The start of second semester can bring back some of that old anxiety, but it's crucial to take a moment to reflect and appreciate the success of our first semester.

There are exciting events and activities lined up for this semester, such as students scheduling classes for next year, 5th-grade Sneak Peek, 8th-grade visit to the high school, M-step testing, PSAT testing for 8th grade, Talent Show, Mid-Winter Break, Honor Roll Breakfast, and more. For the second semester, we will continue offering after-school tutoring on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. The sign-up sheet was sent back in September through email for parents/guardians to sign their students up. Please take advantage of this valuable program to support your child's academic progress.

A quick reminder about school rules: phones, backpacks, blankets, coats need to be in lockers and not visible during class time. We have a policy regarding phone usage, and repeated violations will result in consequences. Please familiarize yourself with these rules to ensure a positive learning environment for everyone. When phones are taken from students, parents will have to come to school to pick up the phone, second, third, and fourth-time students will also receive detention, 5th time will result in a suspension.

As the weather gets colder, it's crucial for safety reasons that students are picked up promptly at the end of the day. Students can't stay at school waiting for rides as it poses a safety concern. If your child does not ride the bus, please arrange for pickup by 3 p.m. We truly do not want students waiting out in cold, but we have no supervision for them.

This semester let's focus on regular attendance. While we understand that students may occasionally need to stay home due to illness or other reasons, consistent attendance is vital for their academic success. Research shows that students who are chronically absent in middle school tend to face challenges in high school and beyond. Let's work together to improve attendance and ensure students arrive on time to class. Speaking of attendance, Eastland Middle School had four students with perfect attendance and zero tardies. We also had 135 students with less than 6 absences for the first semester. When students have less than 6 absences in a semester the data suggest they will be successful in school. That means higher GPA, higher test scores, less discipline issues and practicing good habits that will lead to a successful high school career and beyond.



Newsworthy Notations

Absences

Regular attendance is critical to your child's academic success; however, there are times a student may need to miss school due to illness. Please make sure you verify ALL absences by calling the Attendance Line at 586-445-5701. If your child is absent, they are still responsible for making up missed assignments, which can be requested directly from the teacher.

<u>Disruptive Device Policy (includes airpods, headphones, etc)</u>

<u>First offense</u> – Student surrenders their phone to the office. The student can pick up their phone at the end of the day. Warning issued.

<u>Second offense</u> – Student surrenders their phone to the office. A parent/adult must pick up the phone from EMS. The student is issued a lunch detention.

<u>Third offense</u> – Student surrenders their phone to the office. A parent/adult must pick up the phone from EMS. The student is issued an after-school detention.

<u>Fourth offense - Student surrenders their</u> phone to the office. A parent/adult must pick up the phone from EMS. The student is issued an after-school detention.

<u>Fifth offense</u> - Student surrenders their phone to the office. A parent/adult must pick up the phone from EMS. The student is issued an out of school suspension.

Policy applies to Airpods, headphones, gaming consoles (such as Nintendo Switch) and the like.

When is sick too sick for school?

A regular attendance routine is important for your child's wellbeing and learning. These tips can help you decide when to keep your child home when they don't feel well.





SEND ME TO SCHOOL IF...

- I have a runny nose or just a little cough, but no other symptoms.
- I have NOT had a fever overnight and have NOT taken fever reducing medicine during that time.
- I have a mild stomach ache.
- I have not thrown up overnight and can drink liquids without throwing up.
- I have a mild rash and no other symptoms.
- I have eye drainage WITHOUT fever, eye pain or eyelid redness.



KEEP ME AT HOME IF...

- I have a temperature higher than 100.4
- I have thrown up two or more times in the past 24 hours.
- My stool is watery and I may not make it to the bathroom in time.



SEEK MEDICAL CARE IF...

- I have a temperature higher than 100.4 AND any of the following: ear pain, sore throat, rash, stomachache, headache or tooth pain.
- I have stomach pain and fever, I have bloody or black stool, or I am dehydrated (tired and sleepy, dry mouth) and/or I have not urinated in the last 8 hours.
- I have a persistent cough or trouble breathing, or have a fever with the cough.
- I have eye swelling, eye pain or an eye injury.
- I have a rash that has blisters, is draining, is painful, looks like bruises, and/or I have a fever with the rash.

If you don't know whether to send your child to school, have specific concerns regarding your child's physical or mental health, or are worried your child will spread illness, contact your child's health care provider, a local urgent care or the school nurse. These tips are not meant to take the place of local health department/school district health guidance including about contagious illnesses such as Covid-19 and the flu.
