

Parent / Teacher Conferences - Steenland Elementary

SUGGESTIONS FOR EFFECTIVE PARENT-TEACHER CONFERENCES



The Parent-Teacher Conference is an important and effective way to help parents learn more about their child's progress or problems in school, while at the same time, giving teachers a chance to learn more about the child.

In order to make the conference as productive as possible, teachers generally devote a significant amount of time preparing for meetings. Parents can also do some things to make the most out of conferences. **Below are some suggestions to help parents accomplish this:**

- Jot down the questions you want to ask or comments you want to make.
- Talk with your child. Tell him/her about the conference and ask if there is anything he/she wants you to discuss with the teacher.
- If possible, both parents should attend the conference. Misunderstandings are less likely to occur when both parents hear what the teacher has to say.
- Conferences are scheduled for each family. Please don't take more than your allotted time. If you think a specific problem needs further discussion, ask the teacher for another conference or follow-up with a telephone call.
- Feel free to mention strengths in your child that the teacher may not be aware of. Help the teacher to know your child as a complete individual.
- Listen carefully about how you can help your child.
- Ask the teacher for suggestions about how to solve a problem. If you commit yourself to a project designed to help your child in school, be sure to follow through with your side of the bargain.
- Don't expect the school to perform miracles. If you've had problems with your child at home, it's unrealistic to think the teacher can solve the problems in a few months.
- After the conference is over, discuss it with your child and then check back with the teacher in a few weeks to find out how your child has progressed.
- Above all, accept your child for what he/she is and don't try to make him/her into something he/she can't or isn't ready to become. What is important is that your child try his/her best in both behavior and studies.
